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Situated on a shaded block in the center of Faulkton, a town in north-central South Dakota, the Governor Frank M. Byrne House is a two-story late Stick Style house with Craftsman additions. Rising from a stone and concrete foundation, the walls are clad with clapboard siding and two-dimensional trim characteristic of Stick Style architecture. The house is capped by a crossgable roof covered with asphalt shingles. Bargeboard and fishscale shingles decorate three tall gables on the north (front), east, and west. A Stick Style panel separates two sash windows on the upper level of the west gable end. Fenestration throughout the house is asymmetrical consisting of various shapes and sizes of windows. A bay window with a stained glass transom projects from the southwest corner. During remodeling projects in 1904 and 1917, Craftsman features were applied to the west wing. These items include a concrete capped rubblestone retaining wall around the enclosed front porch with a matching stoop and multiple-light windows with muntins arranged in a diamond pattern. Of the same vintage but of a Colonial Revival nature, modi-A more fied Tuscan columns and an oval window appoint the enclosed porch. recent one-story kitchen addition projects to the south (rear) of the house.

The interior decor throughout the first floor displays a Craftsman influence including a brick fireplace, plain woodwork, and French doors. Much of the upper level remains unchanged from the late 19th Century. The kitchen has been remodeled in 1991.

Several yards south of the house is a square wood frame two-car garage (noncontributing) and a small wood frame pump house (noncontributing).

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Under Criterion B of the National Register Criteria, the Governor Frank M. Byrne House is significant in the area of Politics-Government for its association with the eighth governor of the State of South Dakota (1913-1917). Byrne was a longtime participant in the Republican Party in the state and as governor continued the cause of the Progressive movement begun by earlier administrations. Under the South Dakota State Historical Preservation Plan the property relates to the historic context labeled: IV. Permanent Rural and Urban Pioneer Settlement, E. Government and Education-Related Activities.

Born in Iowa, Frank M. Byrne migrated to Dakota territory in 1879 and secured a homestead in McCook County. In 1883, at the height of the Great Dakota Boom, he moved further west and north to Faulk County, where he engaged in the real estate and loan business. Named for Andrew J. Faulk, third governor of Dakota Territory, the county was organized that year and offered bountiful farm land for would-be settlers. The town of Faulkton, the county seat, was founded in 1886 by the Western Town Lot Company, a subsidiary of the Chicago North Western Railway.

By the time of statehood in 1889, Byrne had become active in regional politics serving on the Republican state central committee. The voters of Faulk County, elected him to the first session of the State Senate. He was again elected to the Senate in 1906. Among his legislative accomplishments are support for the establishment of a direct primary election, laws to restrict corrupt practices and corporate contributions to election campaigns, as well as meaningful railroad regulations. For his endorsement of Progressive reforms, the voters rewarded Byrne by electing him Lieutenant Governor in 1910, serving alongside Governor Robert Vessey.

In 1912, Frank Byrne was elected governor to succeed Vessey in a close splitticket race revolving around the confused national election for president. For two terms beginning in 1913 and running until 1917, Byrne extended the reforms begun by his predecessors. His administration is known for the creation of a tax commission, the passage of an inheritance tax law and a bank guarantee law, and continued railroad rate controls.

Upon leaving office, Byrne and his family returned to live in their home in Faulkton fulltime. In 1923, he moved back to the state capital in Pierre to serve as Commissioner of Agriculture. After a conservative swing the election of 1924, he resigned, and the family moved to Oregon. They never returned to live in South Dakota. Frank M. Byrne is remembered as a perpetual proponent of Progressive reforms and a leader in the movement in South Dakota for increased popular government.

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The house at 1017 St. John in Faulkton was built in circa 1898 and is a late example of Stick Style domestic architecture. In about 1901, the Byrnes purchased the house as their private residence. In 1904 and 1917, they remodeled the house, which then took on some Craftsman flavor. The 1904 work was done by William J. Dodds and W. Forest Jones, local contractors and builders. They continued to maintain it as a residence during the four years that Governor Byrne was in office. Other than the construction of a modern kitchen and interior repainting, the house remains substantially unchanged from when the governor and his family lived there.

The period of significance of the nominated property extends from circa 1901, when Frank Byrne and his family moved into the house, to 1923, when the Byrnes moved from the house never to return for permanent occupancy. Byrne was active in state politics and government during this entire period.
