Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Women's Christian Temperance Union public fountain appears to be a one of a kind commemorative object in the state. Its continued service and its prominent location in Shenandoah attest to an unusual local effort to visually symbolize the aims of that organization.

This 1912 memorial consists of a case iron square base (4' by 4') and pedestal which stands 7' tall. The cap and base are flared. A decorative raised banding with swag and wreath motif encircles the whole just below the cap. A dedicatory plaque on the east side below this band states "Dedicated In Memory of Mrs. H. S. Nichols, WCTU, 1912. For God And Home And Every Land." Matchest bracketed fountains and basins for thirsty people project on the east and west sides of the column. A round fountain basin placed higher up on the north side met the needs of thirsty birds. A ground level fountain on the south side served thirsty pets. The bird fountain is specially treated, in that a lion's head spout throws the water to the basin below. The other fountains use vertical or angles water jets within the basin.

Above the pedistal a central iron column projects vertically to support a neon WCTU sigh and electric street light post. Flower pot circular support rings flank the column below the sign. The present lamp is not original, being of more modern design.

The original fountain apparently lacked the sign and column, these having been added some ten years later. The original frosted glass electric light, possibly added when the sigh was changed, was replaced at some unknown time by the present light. A "No U-Turn" sign for many years also graced the vertical post below the rectangular sign but is now removed. Several cracks in the base are visible on the south side. The fountain was recently painted with aluminum paint.

The fountain occupies the busiest corner in Shenandoah, and stands at the corner of what is termed the flatiron building, a diagonal intersection of Clarinda and Sheridan Streets. Clarinda runs southwest and northeast, Sheridan east and west. The flatiron building because of its triangular lot, has a cut corner end. Historically, buildings in the area were commercial, and included a major hotel, and the post office. The fountain is accompanied on its corner by a street traffic light base and a mailbox.



Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Women's Christian Temperance Union public fountain appears to be a one of a kind commemorative object. Its continued service and its prominent location in Shenandoah attest to an unusual local effort to visually symbolize the aims of that organization.

The WCTU fountain honored one of their local leaders, Mrs. Lavina Nichols (1841-1908), the local founder of the Shenandoah WCTU chapter, and wife of former mayor H. S. Nichols (1833-1916). Dedicated in 1912, the monument cost \$500. Dedicatory ceremonies for this first town public fountain included remarks by then mayor M. M. McGlone, Mrs. Pearl Priest, Mrs. J. P. Nye, Mrs. E. S. Welch, and Mrs. Earl May.

The fountain in addition to honoring Mrs. Nichols offered a drink of water in lieu of alcoholic alternatives, the latter being more often than not readily available within close proximity to the fountain. The offer of water was generously extended to both people and other creatures of the land and air.

The local WCTU chapter peaked in strength in 1901, having some two hundred members at that time. Then decline in numbers began with their successful achievement of nation-wide prohibition in 1920. The local organization dissolved in August 1973 due to a lack of members.

The fountain has for many years shared its corner with a local tavern. The fountain was featured in a color painting by George Shane in the Des Moines Sunday Register in 1953 (June 7).
