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The structure has a gable roof and parapeted gable end walls with two end interior chimneys on each end.

The front entrance consists of a single wooden door topped by a three light transom and flanked by two long side lites with wooden panels below. Pilasters separate the door from the sidelites. This entrance is repeated on the second level, where a similar door gives access to the second level of the portico.

Windows, of which there are four per floor, are double hung with 12 lites per sash and have simple wooden sills and shutters.

The portico consists of four heavy Doric columns on the first level. These columns are made of brick and stuccoed over. The architrave above has two fascia courses and a dentate course. On the second level fluted wooden Corinthian Columns have a bottom layer of water leaves below the acanthus. The cornice is an architrave with three fascia layers and dentals. The wooden balustrade is in a crow's foot pattern.

The plan of the house follows that of the standard Mobile town house. A central hall runs through the building and a stair rises from the front of this hall to the second floor. On the west side are double parlors with identical white marble mantels in each room. These mantels are not original. Windows are recessed with a deep sill; walls are plastered with no cornice; woodwork which frames the sliding doors is in Greek Revival style with the characteristic eared jamb. In the rear parlor bricks of an under floor are exposed.

The report of Nicholas H. Holmes, Sr., the restoration architect in 1947 says, "in the west end of the main building were the outlines of four cells, about 6' x 8' in size. Anchored into the two foot thick brick floor were bare wrought steel eye-bolts." Mr. Holmes further states that two of the old cell doors and frames were reused on the rear wing which was added when the house became a residence. A crude hand made lead knuckle was found under a loose brick in one of the cells. Brick was laid in a lime mortor made from local oyster shells.

On the East side of the hall the square front parlor opens into a rectangular room now furnished as a dining room but thought to have been where court was held. The wooden mantel in the front room is of the early 19th century but not original to the house. Random width pine floors are throughout the house. The second floor follows the same plan with a central hall with two rooms on each side of the hallway. Each room upstairs contains a simple wooden mantle. An open porch connects with the two story wing, which was added when Kirkbride altered the house for his residence.

Over the kitchen are three small rooms probably servants quarters. The original foundations were pine logs running parallel to the length of walls which were peplaced by concrete foundations in the 1940's restoration. Hand wrought nails used in construction and rough ceiling beams and framing of "whip sawn" lumber were also found.
