Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The two and one-half story Helena Y.W.C.A. building is located on a steeply sloping lot at the corner of Park St. and Placer St. in Helena, Montana. daylight basement reads as a full story at the east (rear) end of the building. Basically rectangular in shape, the Y.W.C.A. exhibits stylistic influences and decorative detailing common to both Craftsman and Classical styles that were popular during the period of construction. A wide, collonaded loggia/terrace The loggia is finished with a balcony above, is inset on the south facade. which is accessed from the second floor. Brick steps descend from the terrace to the street. A low brick wall flanks the steps and angles out along the sidewalk to mark the lot line. This low wall works well to tie the steps, terrace, and daylight basement wall together. The textured, earth tone bricks used for the building veneer were manufactured at the Kessler Brick Yard in Helena. Detailing includes simulated quoining fashioned in brick at the corners, a soldier course that wraps around the building between the basement and first floor levels, a brick belt course at the sill level of the second floor windows, and stacked The entry portico on Park St. is rectilinear in design brick window surrounds. and features brick-faced wooden columns which support a second floor balcony. A similar porch and balcony is attached to the east end of the building. windows are predominately 4/1 double hung sash. The overhang of the gently pitched hipped roof is finished with decorative modillions. The overall massing of the Y.W.C.A. is Classical, with a symetrically aligned fenestration, a central, porticoed entrance and an inset loggia at the long axis, all neatly bound by the various belt courses and modillioned roof overhang.

The interior space of the Y.W.C.A. building includes an office, lobby, club rooms, reception rooms, dining room and kitchen, and 43 bedrooms. All are finished with maple, birch, and white pine. With the exception of the lobby, which is finished with smooth plaster work, all of the walls are of rough textured plaster. The basement of the building was originally used for gymnastic classes. main stairway leading from the basement to the top floor is constructed entirely The kitchen, boiler room, and storage rooms are located on the of concrete. The lobby features three large sets of French doors which open first floor. onto the loggia/terrace and two sets of French doors at either end of the room The lobby is finished in dark stained woodwork, which lead to the hallways. panelled walls and, at the west end, is a large fireplace. The individual bedrooms are located on the upper floors and were originally furnished through the donations of members during the 1920's.

The Y.W.C.A. building has been well maintained over the years. It is in excellent condition and retains a very high degree of historic architectural integrity.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Young Women's Christian Association, Independent building in Helena, Montana, is significant because it represents the civic efforts of a number of women within this community to establish an organization for the benefit of young working women in the city during the early 20th Century and because. The building is a fine example of Craftsman Style architecture that occupies a prominent corner close to Helena's commercial district.

The doors to the Young Women's Christian Association building opened to the young, working women of Helena, Montana in 1918. Designed by architect Chester H. Kirk and built by the local contracting firm of Frank Jacoby and Son, the Y.W.C.A. is a substantial, brick building that combines Neo-Classical and Craftsman style features. The Helena chapter of the Y.W.C.A. was organized in 1911. Representatives from most of the churches and synagogues in the community were elected to serve on the organizing committee. Before undertaking the specifics of establishing a local Y.W.C.A. chapter, this group first moved to furnish, through pledges, six barracks rooms for the Helena Salvation Army. The committee also decided to become an Independent Y.W.C.A. and not join the national organization. Today, Helena's Y.W.C.A. is the only Independent Y.W.C.A. in the nation, welcoming Christian as well as non-Christian members. circumstance reflects the early involvement of many Jewish women in the founding of the A building committee was set up in 1913. Mrs H. W. Child, as chairman of the fundraising committee, contributed much of her own money to the building fund. prominent women identified with the organization since its inception were Dr. Maria D. Dean, Miss Frieda Fligelman, Mrs. J.F. McNamee, Mrs. A.K. Prescott, Miss Elenor Cowperwaite, Mrs. Henry Sieben, Mrs. C.T. Perry. Mrs. Grace Richman, Mrs M.L. Gans, Mrs. J.E. Bower, Mrs. D.R. Wallace, Mrs. B.E. Wiley, Mrs. C.B. Nolan, Mrs. C.W. Barnes, Mrs D.B. Price, Mrs. Amelia Bridenbach, Mrs. J. Henry Longmaid, and many others. The first Y.W.C.A. boarding house in Helena was located on Fifth Ave. and managed by a Mrs. Spencer. Since the new building was completed on the corner of Park and Placer Streets, the Helena Y.W.C.A. assumed a prominent position in the community, both visually and socially.

The Young Christian Women's Association was founded in 1855 in England, and in 1866 in the United States. It was soon to become an interdenominational, interracial, and international organization dedicated to the concerns of young working women in urban areas. The role of women changed dramatically during the late 19th Century, as many of the traditional occupations with which women were identified - making clothes, baking bread, processing food, doing laundry, etc. began to move from the home to the factory. Young women who went to the cities for work needed decent, safe housing, places for relaxation, and good but inexpensive food. The Y.W.C.A strove to fulfill these needs as well as to provide classes for young women in stenography, the use of the typewriter and sewing machine, cooking, domestic science, astronomy, and physiology. Organized recreational sports, swimming, calesthenics, and child-care and day camps for children also were promoted by the organization for the public at large by the turn of the Century. The primary emphasis of the Y.W.C.A., however, has been improving the condition of working women. In 1919, the first national Y.W.C.A. industrial conference took place in Washington, D.C. The standards set at this meeting for women in industry included the eight-hour day, no night work, and the right to organize. During the 1930's the Y.W.C.A. was one of the first organizations to recommend national unemployment insurance after completing a series of studies on the effect of unemployment on women.
