Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The William O'Brien House is an irregularly-shaped, Italianate style house located at the corner of Poppleton and Jefferson Sts. in Sheridan, Montana. The hip roofed building is built of brick and has a two story, square-shaped front section and a one story, hip roofed rear wing with an enclosed porch.

The south-facing facade of the roughly L-shaped main block has a segmental brick arch opening and double doors. Each door has two panels and two small windows. The entry is covered by a small, hip roofed porch supported by two free-standing and two engaged square wooden posts with brackets. The three bay facade features the main entrance in the eastern bay and two 1/1 double hung windows in the other bays. The second floor has three 1/1 double hung sashes aligned over each of the first floor openings. All of the windows have segmental brick arches and stone lintels.

The west elevation has a one story, angled, projecting bay located toward the front of the house with three segmental arch openings, each with a 1/1 double hung sash. There is a 1/1 double hung window on the first floor and two windows of the same configuration on the second story. A one story, hip roofed, brick extension with a 1/1 double hung window and four-panel door on the west wall projects to the north (rear) of the main block. Attached to the west side is a shed roofed, enclosed porch featuring a side entrance with transom, solid railing and four large screens. The porch rests on a rubblestone foundation that has been reinforced with concrete.

The east wall of the one story extension has a four-panel door and transom flanked by two 1/1 double hung windows. A corbeled brick chimney is located at the rear of the building. One 1/1 double hung window pierces the second story north wall of the main block. Part of the east wall projects to widen the house toward the rear, making it flush with the one story extension. The east side of the projection features two 1/1 double hung windows on each floor that are aligned above each other. One 1/1 double hung sash is located on each floor of the narrow, south-facing wall of the projection, and another 1/1 double hung window pierces the second story of the other east-facing wall. A one story porch formerly covering part of the east side of the house was removed at an undetermined date.

The brick bearing walls rest on a rubblestone foundation and have overhanging eaves and wide fascia boards. The standing seam metal roof is original while all of the double hung sashes were replaced in 1984. The interior of the house was extensively remodeled in 1984 although all interior doors, hardware and trim remain intact.

A one story, hip roofed garage sheathed with clapboard stands northwest of the house, and is a contributing feature to the property.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Built between 1890-1893, the William O'Brien House is architecturally significant in a local context as an outstanding example of an Italianate style residence in Sheridan, MT., a small (1980 pop. 646) central Madison County community. The distinctive Italianate features of the residence, seen in the overall massing, clean vertical lines, a pronounced cornice above tall, segmentally arched windows, double entrance doors and simple entrance stoop, indicate a design sophistication unmatched by any other residential structure in the town.

The original owner, William O'Brien, came to Montana Territory in 1877 and established a liquor business in Sheridan four years later. As O'Brien's business flourished, he assumed several civic positions, serving as a school trustee, one of the community's original alderman, and as a member of the Montana legislature. As an expression of his financial prosperity and political success, O'Brien had this large and stylish home constructed for his wife and three daughters by 1894. The house has typical characteristics of the Italianate style with its two story, three bay facade, rectangular, irregular box-shape and hipped roof. The one story porch of the O'Brien House is small and restrained with square, bracketed posts. The Italianate style windows are tall, 1/1 double hung sash with segmentally arched tops. The paired doors at the front and side entrances to the O'Brien House are the same shape as the windows. The wide, projecting cornice, while without eave brackets, is nevertheless another distinctive architectural feature that draws attention to the low-pitched hipped roof.

In a local context, the William O'Brien House is an excellent representation of a late Italianate style house. With the exception of the east-facing porch that has been removed, the house retains exceptional historic architectural integrity. Because of its size and appearance, the O'Brien House is a highly visible landmark and the best example of a stylized residence in Sheridan.
