45. Description (Information for the description came from a an unpublished monograph written by Clay Lancaster and from on-site observations.)

Mooreland was built by Colonel Daniel Lawson Moore in 1891 upon his marriage to Miss Minnie Ball of Woodford County. The house with its Romanesque Revival detailing took five years to complete. The architect is unknown, but Clay Lancaster, an architectural historian familiar with the architecture of Louisville has noted in a private monograph that the residence is similar to residences designed there by architects C.J. Clarke and Arthur Loomis.

Mooreland has a double-pile, central passage plan. The main or north facade of the two-story building is carefully tooled limestone. The other facades are brick with limestone used as an accent. The north facade features a one-story veranda with large semicircular arches supported by short round pillars of polished granite with elaborately carved limestone capitals. The veranda is framed by octagonal forms at each end. On the north end is a two-story bay window, while the south end features a four-story octagonal tower. On the south facade there is an arcaded piazza, while on the north facade is a porte-cochere.

The steeply hipped roof has pedimented dormers with tall brick chimneys. To the south of Mooreland is a one and one half story, brick servants' quarters. It is three-bay with a gable roof and a single bay porch over the entrance. A plan of Mooreland drawn by Clay Lancaster is included on page 4.

### Statement of Significance

The Moreland House is significant under Criterion C for the period 1891 as a local example of Romanesque Revival architecture. The stone dwelling has a corner tower with conical tower, wrap-around porch with cushion capitals carved in elaborate floral motifs. The outbuilding dates to the same period as the house.

#### Verbal Boundary Justification

The boundary was chosen arbitrarily to provide a setting for the house, and to preserve its setback from the Lexington Road. The boundary lines were drawn to include all of the contributing domestic elements and to exclude the agricultural fields on the north, south, and east.

The nominated area includes two contributing buildings.
