Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Thomas W. Gardiner House is a two-story, brick Queen Anne residence built in 1888 in an asymmetrical plan. The house is located on an urban lot at the corner of Sugg and Seminary Streets and is oriented towards Sugg Street. The yard of the house contains various shade trees and on two sides of the residence is a cast iron fence contemporary with the residence.

Typical of the Queen Anne style, the house has tall interior chimneys and a hipped-roof main block from which wings with other rooflines project. The main entrance has its original frame and glass double doors with a two-light transom. The windows are rectangular one-over-one sash set into segmental arches. Brick beltcourses divide the first and second stories. On the second story of the entrance bay is an original small frame porch with milled posts, vergeboard brackets, engaged shed roof, and a railing with turned balusters. In the front and west gable field are fishscale shingles; the front gable also features a Palladian design vent window.

On the west facade is a two-story three-sided bay with a flat roof that serves as a small attic balcony. The balcony has a shed roof that is an extension of the jerkinhead roof of the main block's west wing, milled posts, turned balusters, and an original door with flanking 1/1 sash windows. At the rear facade is a ca. 1950 one-story brick addition and enclosed frame sleeping porch at the second story. On the main (south) facade is a small porch with ca. 1970 wrought iron posts and a concrete deck which has replaced the original frame porch.

The interior of the residence retains its original cast iron mantles, parquet flooring, five panel doors and staircase with milled newel post and balusters. At the rear of the house is a non-contributing ca. 1970 frame garage. In front of the house and on the west facade is an original dart cast iron fence which is a contributing structure.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Dr. Thomas Gardiner House is significant for its association with Dr. Thomas Gardiner, a prominent physician of the early 20th century. The house was built in 1888 for Gardner who resided here until his death in 1929. During his life Gardner was one of the most prominent physicians in Kentucky.

Dr. Thomas Gardiner became a resident of Madisonville in 1876 and was a practising physician until 1886 when he entered the pharmaceutical business. On March 4, 1888 he acquired this property and soon after had this two-story brick Queen Anne residence constructed. Recognized throughout Kentucky as a mental disease specialist, he was appointed to many government offices dealing with the care of the mentally ill. He was appointed Superintendent of Kentucky's Lakeland Hospital by Governor James McCreary and was later appointed Superintendent of the Western Kentucky State Hospital at Hopkinsville by Governor W.O. Bradley. His career culminated with his appointment by Governor J.C.W. Beckham as Chairman of the State Board of Control which eventually became the Charities and Corrections Board, and he had jurisdiction over the state's penal institutions and hospitals and served in this capacity for several years. In addition to his professional work Gardner also served as city councilman and on the Board of Education. He died in August of 1929 and the property remains in the hands of descendants.





Verbal Boundary Description: The boundary for the Dr. Thomas Gardiner House is block 26, lot 1 illustrated on accompanying Hopkins County tax map 22 which is drawn at a scale of 1" = 200" and on the accompanying sketch map.

<u>Verbal Boundary Justification</u>: The boundary for the Dr. Thomas Gardner House includes the entire city lot that has historically been associated with the property. Included in the boundary is a small garage at the rear of the house which is unobtrusive and does not detract from the integrity of the site.
