Summary Paragraph

The Sieroty House of 1941 is located in the Movie Colony district of Palm Springs. This singlefamily dwelling was one of the earliest residential commissions Albert Frey received after settling permanently in the desert a few years earlier. It appeared the same year as his own dwelling, Frey House I. While both houses feature a flat roof and large sliding glass doors, the Sieroty House differs in its wood frame construction and stucco finish. In addition, the Sieroty property is punctuated with numerous steel frame fixed and casement windows. Since its original construction, the Sieroty family—who continue to own the residence—retained Frey to design an addition to the living room and sliding glass doors for a bedroom. The house is in excellent condition and exhibits a high level of integrity.

Narrative Description

Designed early in Frey's Palm Springs career, the Sieroty House is finished in stucco versus the corrugated metal and asbestos board that clads his later residential work. The dwelling's flat roof, deep overhangs, pipe post supports, open carport, large expanses of fixed glazing, and sliding glass doors are elements that appeared throughout his architectural career.

Riverside, California County and State

The one-story house is L-shaped in plan, and located in one of the city's oldest residential neighborhoods known as the Movie Colony due to the presence of numerous Hollywood luminaries who resided there prior to World War II. The large parcel upon which the dwelling sits is landscaped primarily with coarse gravel and desert plants with tall hedges and palm trees surrounding the perimeter. As noted, steel-framed fixed and casement windows punctuate the stucco-finished house on all elevations including most corners. The rear (south) elevation facing the swimming pool is entirely glazed with an enormous floor-to-ceiling fixed window adjacent to sliding glass doors. The projecting bedroom also contains pool-facing sliding glass doors. Inside the house, the living room fireplace is framed by glazed tiles that together display a short poem written by owner Julian Sieroty and dated 1941, the year of the home's construction. Two small bedrooms are located at the east end of the house with the kitchen and dining room on the west end. The varnished wood front door features a porthole window. Extending from the west elevation is the single vehicle carport with its flat roof supported by steel posts.

Building permits document the introduction of a swimming pool at the rear of the house in 1951 and, in 1957, the installation of pool-facing sliding glass doors to the southwest bedroom. The addition of air conditioning in 1965 resulted in the erection of a tall, recessed metal screen on the roof to conceal the equipment and ductwork. Of these modifications, only the metal screen on the roof is visible from the public right-of-way. While detracting from Frey's original flat roof design, the screen—which is easily removable—does not materially affect integrity of design, materials, or workmanship given the unmodified nature of the remainder of the house. As a result, the Sieroty House is able to convey its architectural significance because the property retains the essential physical features associated with the early work of Albert Frey. These features include a flat roof, deep overhangs, stucco finish, steel framed casement windows, large expanses of glass, and slender steel posts. In addition, the design rejects applied ornamentation and historical references. The Sieroty House retains integrity of association as it continues to be owned by the Sieroty family and used as a single-family residence. The dwelling is at its original location and the setting has been retained. Because of these factors, integrity of feeling also remains high.

Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph (Provide a summary paragraph that includes level of significance, applicable criteria, justification for the period of significance, and any applicable criteria considerations.)

The Sieroty House is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C at the local level of significance in the area of Architecture. The property embodies the distinctive characteristics of residential architecture associated with the modern movement as interpreted by Albert Frey for the desert environment of the Coachella Valley. In addition, the property meets *The Architecture of Albert Frey* Multiple Property Submission registration requirements for single-family residences in association with the historic context "Desert Modern Design in the Coachella Valley, 1934-1965." The period of significance corresponds with the building's date of construction, 1941.

Narrative Statement of Significance (Provide at least **one** paragraph for each area of significance.)

The property was designed by architect Albert Frey for Julian M. Sieroty in 1941. The original building permit was not located by the city. As an early example of Albert Frey's residential work, the Sieroty House is important because it demonstrates Frey's initial use of stucco as an exterior finish in contrast with his preference for corrugated metal or concrete asbestos board cladding requiring little to no maintenance that appeared on his own homes and later residential commissions. The house is clearly a Frey design in its flat roof, deep eaves, metal-framed windows, generous use of plate glass windows and sliding glass doors, and slender pipe roof supports. An absence of applied ornamentation and a rejection of historical references further denote the house as representative of the modern movement.

The Sieroty House exemplifies the distinctive characteristics of single family residences associated with architect Albert Frey. The importance of the house and its significance within the "Desert modern design in the Coachella Valley 1934-1965" historic context are presented in the Multiple Property Documentation Form. The house is a key example of the single-family residence property type that maintains sufficient integrity to convey its significance as a readily identifiable work of master architect Albert Frey. The property meets National Register Criterion C because it embodies the distinctive characteristics of residential architecture associated with Albert Frey and is the work of a master architect.




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Sieroty House Name of Property



Enclosed please find **The Architecture of Albert Frey Multiple Property Submission** consisting of the Multiple Property Documentation Form and ten associated individual nominations to the National Register of Historic Places. On August 7 in Sacramento, California, the California State Historical Resources Commission unanimously approved the MPS and found ten individual properties eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C at the local level of significance.

The enclosed eight disks contain the true and correct copy of the nominations for THE ARCHITECTURE OF ALBERT FREY MULTIPLE PROPERY SUBMISSION. Disk 1 includes the Multiple Property Documentation Form, correspondence, and ten associated individual nominations for Carey House, Fire Station #1, Frey House II, Kocher-Samson Building, Loewy House, North Shore Yacht Club, Palm Springs City Hall, Palm Springs Tramway Valley Station, Sieroty House, and Tramway Gas Station to the National Register of Historic Places. Disks 2 through 8 contain photographs in this same order.

The resources are eligible under Criterion C because they embody the distinctive characteristics of residential, commercial, civic, or religious architecture associated with architect Albert Frey. Frey's architecture helped define desert modernism in the Coachella Valley. Desert modernism is the adaptation of modern architectural concepts to the climatic extremes of the Coachella Valley while embracing the area's unique natural setting of mountains and open vistas. The geographical area of the MPS is Riverside County, California.

The first ten properties nominated under this MPS are as follows, in alphabetical order. Period of significance is the date of construction, indicated in parentheses.

- Carey House: 651 West Via Escuela, Palm Springs (1956)
- Fire Station #1: 227 North Indian Avenue, Palm Springs (1955)
- Frey House II: 686 Palisades Drive, Palm Springs (1964)
- Kocher-Samson Building: 766 North Palm Canyon Drive, Palm Springs (1934)
- Loewy House: 600 Panorama Road, Palm Springs (1946)

- North Shore Yacht Club: 99-155 Sea View Drive, Mecca (1958)
- Palm Springs City Hall: 3200 East Tahguitz Way, Palm Springs (1952-1956)
- Palm Springs Tramway Valley Station: 1 Tram Way, Palm Springs (1963)
- Sieroty House: 695 East Vereda Sur, Palm Springs (1941)
- Tramway Gas Station: 2901 North Palm Canyon Drive, Palm Springs (1965)

The MPS, including the MPDF and ten associated properties, is nominated on behalf of a group of private individuals. In its role as representative of the City of Palm Springs, a Certified Local Government, the Historic Site Preservation Board did not comment on the nomination.

Eleven letters of support were received, including a letter from the City of Palm Springs in support of the three city-owned properties. A letter of objection is on file from Mount San Jacinto Winter Park Authority, owner of Palm Springs Tramway Valley Station and governing body of Palm Springs Aerial Tramway. The Authority, a public agency and public corporation of the State of California, was created by the Mount San Jacinto Winter Park Authority Act Ch.1040 of the Statutes of 1945, as amended by Ch.70 of the Statutes of 1947 and Ch.1004 of the Statutes of 1951, of the State of California.
