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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Several years ago, the Old Kingsport or Boatyard Presbyterian Church was moved from its original location to a ridge overlooking the old Boatyard area of Kingsport and the Holston River. The church had been built in the area of Rossville, a town which had been organized in 1818, and which, along with the town of Christianville, was incorporated in 1822 to become Kingsport.

The church building is a rectangular white clapboard structure with a pitched roof, surmounted by a simple spire. Details of the bell tower and the main doorway, as well as in the interior, suggest a Greek Revival influence. All openings are original; the windows have dark green shutters.

A small foyer, with steps to the slave gallery, separates the entrance from the sanctuary. The sanctuary, which was restored by the local chapter of the Association for the Preservation of Tennessee Antiquities, is painted white. To the front is a simple raised altar platform. Beyond the santucary are small rooms used for Sunday school classes. When the building was moved, a concrete basement was built to provide additional space.

7. <u>DESCRIPTION</u> (Cont.)

The church building was moved in 1953 about 1,000 east from its original site in Rossville to its present site. It was moved "intact" without the loss of a single pane of glass. The structure was moved to escape the noise from passing trains. The only major alteration to the building occurred when the building was moved, at which time a basement was built to contain a social hall and Sunday School rooms.

The Old Kingsport or Boatyard Presbyterian Church represents one of the earliest churches organized in Kingsport. The present building, although not on its original site, is the oldest church still standing in the city.

On May 20, 1820, the Presbyterian congregation was formed with fourteen members present. Their first church building was a log structure located in the still existing Boatyard Presbyterian Church Cemetery. The log church was replaced by the clapboard structure, which, though partially built by April, 1845, was not completed until 1851.

Frederick Augustus Ross not only gave both the land and the money needed to build the new church, but also served as its rector free of charge. Ross had inherited vast estates in the Kingsport area from his father, David Ross, who had built the "Great Iron Furnace," an iron forge, and numerous other businesses. The son, F.A. Ross, made his own contributions to the Kingsport area. He had laid out Rossville, the town which was to merge with Christianville in 1822 to become Kingsport. He built the first bridge over the North Fork of the Holston River on the Great Stage Road and a large mill factory. Of his many contributions, the Presbyterian Church is the only building left standing.

Ross and William G. Brownlow were the main orators in the bitter feud between the New Presbyterian Church and the Methodist Church in the mid-nineteenth century. Much of Brownlow's book, <u>The Great</u> <u>Iron Wheel Examined</u>, published in 1856, was an attack on Ross's earlier writings which were published in "The Calvinistic Magazine." Ross was also a strong and vocal opponent to slavery.

Although the building has been moved from its original location, it is significant not only for its architectural value, but also because it is the only remaining structure contributed to Frederick Ross, a very important early settler of what is now Kingsport.
