Recent Successes

Naugatuck River Greenway: Thomaston

CT DEP Recreational Trails & Greenways Program through this steep and industrial valley. Momentum has grown steadily as other towns installed riverfront trails.

In 2008, upriver in Thomaston, RTCA staff and volunteers worked with townspeople in a greenway trail workshop to produce a list of implementation projects.

In 2009, Trail Committee volunteers created a one-mile loop to celebrate historic architecture and the role of clock-maker Seth Thomas.

A colorful brochure and map provides vignettes

about people and places while clock faces stenciled on the sidewalks mark the route. Next, volunteers hope to connect the downtown loop to the recreational area of a Corps of Engineers dam upstream.

1. Last Green Valley Water Trails

Create a network of water trails in the upper Thames Basin. Gain National Recreation Trail designations for segments on the Quinebaug and the Willimantic Rivers, with provisional Paddle Guides for each.

2. Litchfield Community Greenway Trail

Project Goal

Establish a five-mile-long greenway trail as the spine of a town-wide recreational trail network for pedestrians and cyclists. For 2010, create one initial trail segment and summarize existing conditions and desired trail features in a work plan and on a vision map.

Last Green Valley Water Trails

The Last Green Valley, Inc.

For ten years, the Quinebaug–Shetucket Rivers Heritage Corridor (known as The Last Green Valley, Inc.) has mobilized citizens, businesses and public officials to promote locally grown products, create a regional identity and showcase cultural resources. In 2009, two months of Source to Sea events turned attention to the health and recreational potential of the rivers themselves.

While Last Green Valley staff organized more than 100 events, Rivers & Trails staff compiled provisional Paddle Guides for three new water trail segments and one already created by the Corps of Engineers at East Brimfield Lake. A Steering Committee of volunteers will continue to develop the inaugural segments into a water trail network for the Thames River Basin, promoting fun, safety and erosion control.
