

Recent Success

Riverside Citizen Science, Riverside County

Riverside, once renowned for its science community, is returning to its roots with the advent of the Riverside Citizen Science partnership. James Bryant, of the Riverside Metropolitan Museum, and Rusty Russell, of the Smithsonian Institution, reached out to like-minded individuals to create Citizen Science Week. The partners and community response was so favorable that the idea to make citizen science available to the community year round was pollinated.

A working group was formed in 2011 to create a strategic plan to bring this vision to the community. The partnership coalesced to write several successful grants together, including a Proposition 84 Nature Education Facility Grant to fund the construction of the Ameal Moore Nature Center in Sycamore Canyon, where the heart of the citizen science activities will begin. Scheduled to open in spring 2014, the nature center will host citizen science programs, including a Bioblitz where participants have limited time to count species. A recently-awarded Ticket to Ride Grant from the National Park Foundation will connect junior high school students to Joshua Tree National Park where they will learn about building sustainable trails and camp out under the desert starry sky.

1. Big Tujunga Trails

The focus of this project is the 25 miles of trails in the Sunland/Tujunga and Verdugo Hills area that were damaged by the 2009 Station Fire. These trails cross over various jurisdictions and therefore have different standards, guidelines, and management. Trail development, restoration, and coordination have been delayed and many of the trail plans are decades old. The NPS will work with interested parties to create a multi-agency taskforce to address trail restoration, connectivity, and protection.

2. Boyle Heights Urban Pathways

Project Goal

The NPS is working with the Amigos de los Rios and the Weingart East Los Angeles YMCA to audit streets in the Boyle Heights community for

walkability. The auditing process provides an inventory of necessary improvements to pedestrian infrastructure for implementation in future street and beautification projects. Also, the YMCA Youth Institute will design six to eight urban pathways, or walking loops, for the community to take inspiring and interesting walks throughout the neighborhood.

3. Butte County Outdoor Education for All

programs that will connect youth to the outdoors. These efforts will yield improved local stewardship of natural resources and more environmentally aware and active youth. The NPS will facilitate strategic planning for this growing outdoor education partnership to promote its success and sustainability in the years ahead.

4. Butterfield Overland Trail

Project Partner: Riverside County Regional Park and Open Space District NPS Contact: Patrick Johnston Location: Temescal Valley, located in southwest Riverside County between the cities of Lake Elsinore and Corona. Congressional District: CA - 42

The NPS is supporting local land managers, resource agencies, and community partners on a collaborative planning process to identify a preferred recreational trail alignment for a 16-mile segment of the historic Butterfield Overland Trail running through Temescal Valley. This effort will lead to the development of

a prioritized action plan for trail implementation and corridor resource protection, including key linkages to nearby natural, cultural, and recreational resources.

5. California Coastal TrailProject Partners: Fifteen coastal

This organizational planning effort will help facilitate completion and improved operation and stewardship of the 1,200-mile California Coastal Trail. The NPS will continue to work with CoastWalk California, the State Coastal Conservancy, California State Parks, and local partners to build organizational capacity, assist with outreach and define a blueprint for success for an emerging California Coastal Trail Association.

6. Carless California

The goal of CarLess California is to improve and promote accessibility and mobility to outdoor recreation destinations on federal lands for all of California's diverse population. The NPS is participating on an interagency extended team to help identify potential linkages between target communities and multiple outdoor destinations using alternative transportation systems.

7. Glendora Wash Trails

The long-term project goal is to create 11 miles of multi-use trails along three stream/wash corridors in Glendora, focusing on San Dimas Wash as a pilot project. In partnership with the city, key stakeholders, and community members, the NPS will help develop a replicable process for planning and implementing these streamside trails.

8. Griffith Park Anza Trail

The NPS will help develop a concept plan to enhance Griffith Park's 4-mile certified segment of the Juan Bautista de Anza National Historic Trail. The plan will include identification of opportunities for improved community trail connections, improved signage and interpretation to increase trail visibility, and recommendations for trail enhancements focused on long-term conservation and sustainability of the historic resource.

9. Hidden Valley Trails

This effort will focus on improved access to the South Fork of the Trinity River within the Shasta Trinity National Forest. The NPS will help the US Forest Service and local community partners develop a trail connectivity plan linking existing and proposed segments of a US Forest Service managed trail along 25 miles of this wild and scenic river.

10. Landowners Toolbox for San Benito County

This is a project of the San Benito Working Landscapes Group, an emerging collaborative of agencies, non-governmental organizations, ranchers, and farmers, developing common ground for protecting and enhancing the working landscapes of San Benito County and adjacent lands. The NPS will assist the group in developing a toolbox of resources that address various concerns identified by landowners. Some of the resources may include communication tools, technical assistance, and funding programs.

11. Los Angeles River Recreation Map

This project will result in a comprehensive printed map and an online portal for recreation opportunities, amenities, and ecological features on and around the 51-mile stretch of the Los Angeles River and surrounding riverfront cities. As part of the mapping, the community partners will highlight key sites for visitors to see the beauty of the river while recreating. The NPS is assisting with compiling information about existing and proposed river opportunities, restoration, and the design of the final maps.

12. Lower Stanislaus River Access and Conservation

Project Partners: Cities of Oakdale, Ripon, and Riverbank NPS Contact: Linda Stonier Location: Lower Stanislaus River Congressional District: CA - 9,10

The cities of Oakdale, Ripon, and Riverbank are working together to spearhead a multi-jurisdictional effort for the Lower Stanislaus River, from Goodwin Dam just above Knight's Ferry to Caswell State Park. The effort balances outdoor recreation, conservation, flood management, hazard mitigation, water quality, and economic development. The three cities know that their shared goals for this 50-mile corridor can only be achieved if they genuinely represent those of area residents as well and those of other key public agency partners and private stakeholder groups. The NPS will help facilitate a planning process and community engagement strategy for the project. To date, the NPS has conducted a workshop for the Oakdale working group to define, prioritize, and set tasks for several river-related projects along the Lower Stanislaus River. The NPS has also helped the 3 cities conduct an "opportunities and issues" river tour for public agency representatives at the local, state, and federal level.

13. Mono Yosemite Gateway Trail

Mono County seeks to formalize existing trails in Lee Vining that connect the Mono Lake, Mono Basin Scenic Visitors Center, downtown Lee Vining, and recreation opportunities on US Forest Service lands. Conceptual long-term connections to Yosemite

National Park will also be identified. The NPS will facilitate a collaborative planning process in order to identify viable trail alignments and prepare a conceptual plan.

14. Murrieta Creek Trail

This project will assess a 15-mile stretch of the Murrieta Creek corridor, which runs through the cities of Temecula, Murrieta, and Wildomar within southwest Riverside County, for opportunities to establish a regional trail linkage along the creek. NPS staff will facilitate a team of local agencies and community stakeholder groups to identify opportunities for trail connections, establish development priorities, and create a collaborative action plan for trail implementation.

15. Northeast Los Angeles Riverfront Collaborative

This collaboration, led by the City of Los Angeles and made possible by a grant from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development, will support multi-agency, cross-disciplinary planning for a comprehensive, complementary system of community revitalization improvements along a portion of the Los Angeles River's ecologically-vibrant, 10-mile Glendale Narrows stretch. Building on efforts from the Urban Waters Federal Partnership and the America's Great Outdoors Initiative, both of which focused on the Los Angeles River, the NPS will support development of recommendations for enhanced river access, including water-based recreation.

16. Point Molate Beach Park

Point Molate Beach is a 1/3-mile strand of beach located on San Francisco Bay. This 11-acre park (part of a former navy fuel depot) was a popular destination for Richmond area residents from the early fifties through the latter half of the 1990's, but is now in need of improvements. The site includes a potential connection to the San Francisco Bay Trail and a proposed access point for the San Francisco Bay Water Trail. The NPS will assist with landscape architectural design support and conceptual site planning to improve access.

17. San Joaquin River Recreation

The online guide will help visitors locate river activities along the 300 miles of river and will include a calendar of events and programs.



The NPS is working with the Inland Empire Water Keeper and partners to analyze opportunities along 20 miles of the Santa Ana River within Riverside that can be considered viable for access to the river. The Santa Ana River is an important and unique natural resource in the Inland Empire, with the potential to provide much needed outdoor passive recreation for the community.

19. Santa Ana Wellness Corridor

This project seeks the inclusion and integration of 10-15 miles of bike and walking routes and paths into the Santa Ana's bike plan and possibly into Orange County's plans. Additionally, the project aspires to improve the existing and planned bike and pedestrian facilities for safe access and overall walkability and bikability. The NPS will assist Latino Health Access with case studies of bike plans and infrastructure from other cities and with engaging in the City of Santa Ana's Circulation Element of their General Plan.

20. Tehachapi Trails

21. Whittier Greenway Extension

Building on the success of the city's recent completion of a 4.5-mile segment of the Whittier Greenway Trail, a rail-trail project that received NPS assistance in the past, the city is embarking on the establishment of a 2.7-mile trail extension eastward to the city limits. This extension will facilitate the ability of adjacent jurisdictions to plan and develop their reaches of this regional trail that will be an important east-west component of the regional trail network. The NPS will support city planning and public engagement processes.

The upcoming year of citizen activities will be coupled with technology and social media. The USDA Forest Service Pacific Research Station Forest Fire Laboratory at Riverside is working to create a social media platform where citizen scientists can create a profile on "My Sycamore Canyon" for sharing, discussion, and observations in the park. Lastly, the City of Riverside completed the development of a smartphone app Nature Spotter. The Nature Spotter app sends photos of plants, insects, and animals to the Riverside Metropolitan Museum Curator and other scientists for verification of species. To date, Nature Spotter users have made 130 observations of 95 species in the greater Riverside area. These observations range from the Western screech owl to the California swollenstinger scorpion and are shared using the iNaturalist website under the Riverside Citizen Science project.

Cooley Landing, East Palo Alto

For decades, Cooley Landing, with 360 degree views of San Francisco Bay, was out of reach to the people of adjacent East Palo Alto. Named for its one-time owner, this spit of land had supported various commercial uses until 1998, when the major portion of the property was purchased by a local land trust to protect it from future development. By 2004, the City of East Palo Alto was considering Cooley Landing as a possible location for outdoor recreation facilities, but faced a complex pattern of ownership and jurisdiction that had evolved at the site.

The NPS played a key role in facilitating discussions between the city, owners, and stakeholders, bringing them to agreement on appropriate uses and level of recreation development at the site. This agreement opened the door for further cooperation and eventual donation of the site to the city. This year, the city completed site remediation and began construction on planned facilities. Upon completion of the project, targeted for 2015, the community will be able to fully enjoy the spectacular views, walking trails, fishing, wildlife viewing, and indoor and outdoor gathering spaces.
