Recent Successes

Lindenwald Connector Trail

The route of a former electric trolley line offers the potential to create a 5-mile multi-use trail connecting the communities of Kinderhook, Stuyvesant Falls, and Stockport. A branch trail also could link with the Martin Van Buren National Historic Site.

Kinderhook received a \$10,000 grant for a trail feasibility study, which will be completed by a State University of New York - Albany graduate planning studio under the guidance of the multi-town trails committee with RTCA assistance. The study will include public workshops as well as detailed analysis.

RTCA will also work with the Columbia Land Conservancy and local groups to convene a conference to foster exchange among local communities with similar trail interests.

Recent Successes cont.

Hyde Park Healthy Trails

Hyde Park's Trails weave through four National Park sites, a state park, three town parks and a nonprofit nature preserve. RTCA helped the trails take on a new dimension by helping create a series of audio podcasts for six trails. Markers along the trails prompt the visitor to listen to recorded sounds and stories special to each trail, as told by more than 25 local people. The project was funded by a NPS "Connect Trails to Parks" grant, and the podcasts are hosted on the website of the Home of Franklin D. Roosevelt National Historic Site.

A new trail easement enabled volunteers to begin building a new, one-mile section of trail along the Hudson River, on lands owned by Scenic Hudson Land Trust and the Anderson Center.

The national Recreation Trails Coalition awarded the Hyde Park Trails committee and RTCA an "outstanding achievement" award for youth engagement, for a recently-completed Recreation Trails Program (RTP) grant which improved or rebuilt over 6 miles of trails.

Carr's Creek Watershed Management

For the Sidney Center Improvement Group, the past year was all about "coming of age." This small non-profit organization grew in its ability to represent the communality's desire for a healthy Carr's Creek watershed; its effective outreach to citizens, local leaders and organizations; and its resourcefulness to accomplish much with very little. The Improvement Group also secured the aid of a National Fish and Wildlife Foundation technical assistance grant to evaluate stream flow characteristics in Carr's Creek and Willow Brook and recommend actions to reduce flood risk. A day-long tour conducted for the Chesapeake Bay Program Director involved visiting a wetland restoration site, observing presentations by Sidney High School students of recently completed water resource projects, and gathering with land trusts working in New York's Upper Susquehanna Basin.
