Recent Successes

Veterans Memorial Park Trail Revitalization

Several years ago, Barrington Town Planner Philip Hervey began looking for ways to revitalize Veterans Memorial Park, to make it not only a place for families once again, but also a place for fitness, appreciation of local history, and a resource for the adjacent YMCA summer camp.

In 1946, the Town of Barrington purchased 100 acres of a former brickyard to honor veterans and provide open space in the rapidly growing town near Providence. Where clay had been removed in the heyday of brick-making, now stood a pond. Surrounding the pond were acres of mature woodlands, soon to be criss-crossed with built-in picnic grills, trails, and two boat launches. Veterans Memorial Park was a beehive of activity from the 50's to the 70's.

While the park remained popular with anglers and walkers from the neighborhood, the picnic facilities fell into disrepair and the trails became a confusing collection of paths. The park became less relevant to the community and looked it.

The town requested Rivers, Trails, and Conservation Assistance help in 2010 to create a way-finding system, design trail improvements and mobilize more volunteers as a friends group.

During the first year, volunteers mapped every formal and bootleg trail, established color-coded loops and then posted aluminum confidence markers. Luckily, a professional graphic designer joined the committee and soon produced a signage program to integrate new trailhead kiosks, a trail map, and the way-finding markers. Other volunteers led public programs to enjoy vernal pools and owls.

Project Goal

Transform this 88-acre oasis from neglected public land into vibrant and safe public space that is once again widely used and appreciated by generations of Providence residents.

RTCA Role

Help the board of directors to recruit new members, expand volunteer participation on committees, and cultivate future leaders. RTCA will help to build a larger friends organization to carry on the stewardship.

Recent Successes cont.

John Monroe of the Rivers, Trails, and Conservation Assistance program helped the committee to organize their efforts and supervised relocation of a trail segment that had somehow wandered onto private property. On National Trails Day 2011, a dozen volunteers cleared a new 300-yard trail and closed the old trail with the woody debris.

In 2012, Boy Scouts and volunteers will install trailhead and interpretive signs. Trail maps will be available online and in print. Finally, a gateway will be established for the Y summer camp to encourage walking field trips into the park.
