## **Cacapon Project Tells Conservation Story**

Far more than any single accomplishment, the Cacapon Land Trust has clearly demonstrated the positive influence committed, caring people have on land conservation throughout the Chesapeake region. The Trust has proactively protected more than 10,000 acres since 2002, many of which are in large, connected conservation hubs.

To celebrate local landowner stewardship and to extend this sense of stewardship to newcomers, the Trust commissioned an oral histories project. Recently completed, these stories will be assembled in a book portraying the love people have for their land and why, as one landowner explained, "it ain't for sale at any price." Land Trust staff and Board members share their experiences and hard-earned lessons at conservation workshops, national conferences and the "back porch board rooms" of other land trusts. Continuing in their typical pioneering way, the Cacapon and Lost Rivers Land Trust is currently exploring international markets for carbon credit trading.

"I came from a multi-generational farming family in the Cacapon Valley. I live by the standards of my forefathers, to leave the land in better shape for the next generation than I received it. Putting the farm in conservation easements is the most important thing I can do for stewardship today and for the young farmers of tomorrow. It means a lot to me knowing the farm can continue to help feed the nation. I would not want it to grow houses."

## Recent Successes cont.

### **Great Eastern Trail Summit Builds Concensus**

In 2009, the RTCA program helped the newly-formed Great Eastern Trail Association fill the 120-mile gap in the tri-state corner of West Virginia, Kentucky, and Virginia. The Great Eastern Trail (GET) is the newest long-distance hiking trail being created in the United States. It parallels the Appalachian National Scenic Trail, and will be about 1800-miles long. The GET runs from Alabama to New York, linking the Florida National Scenic Trail and the North Country National Scenic Trail. The Community Design Assistance Center at Virginia Tech partnered with the project, compiled the maps into an electronic GIS format, and prepared printed maps for review. A Trail Summit of 40 people from the 3 states was held in June, and succeeded with forming a consensus decision for a primary northern route through West Virginia, and a proposed southern loop. recently was annexed into the city to facilitate creation of two planned unit developments that will include trail systems in conformance with the newly created trails plan.
