Recent Successes

Silverton Digging Into Trails, River, and Conservation Projects

Over the past several months residents of Silverton and the Mountain Studies Institute (MSI) have built new trail, improved existing pathways, and planted native vegetation along the Animas River. In a series of volunteer work days, MSI staff planned, designed, and coordinated the construction of new trail in town and improvements of the abandoned railroad right-of-way on which the Rainbow Route trail is located. Rivers, Trails, and Conservation Assistance (RTCA) staff offered technical input on some of the more difficult sections of the Rainbow Route; the trail in town generally follows an alignment that had been recommended by RTCA. The MSI outreach coordinator, Whitney Gaskill, has been working with the local schools to get youth involved in planning activities and restoration work along the Animas. On one outing, middle school students learned how to use native plants to help anchor a shifting streambank, then they planted willow cuttings along impacted sections of the river. Whitney is also working with the local youth on researching Silverton's history for interpretive facilities along the trail.

Costilla County's Public Land Renewal

In October 2011, Costilla County, in collaboration with National Park Service (NPS), Colorado Open Lands, and the Rio Grande Headwaters Land Trust, began the planning process to

identify recreational opportunities for the county's master plan. Community members quickly identified the need to improve the Sangre De Cristo Greenbelt Trail and Rito Seco Park, the only existing open space trail in the county.

Costilla County was granted financial assistance from Great Outdoors Colorado to restore portions of the 3-mile single track trail and clean-up heavily used areas of the Rito Seco Park. In October 2011, the restoration work was completed by the Los Valles Conservation Corps camping crew. The crew spent 8 days and 660 hours maintaining and improving 2 acres within the Rito Seco Park and approximately one-mile of the trail in an effort to increase visitation and utilization of the trail and open space areas in the county.

The county also saw this as an opportunity to engage young adults in a service project that will improve outdoor educational opportunities for the community's enjoyment while teaching them about resource management and the significance of protecting open space. In the end, the project proved to be of great benefit to both the community who lacks available and well-maintained public lands and to the students involved in renovating the Greenbelt Trail and Rito Seco Park.

2. Costilla County Trails, Recreation and Open Space (TROS)

Project Partner: Costilla County RTCA Contact: Katherine Faz Location: Costilla County

Project Goal

Develop a publicly supported TROS master plan that includes implementation strategies for trails, recreation, and open space projects within the county.

RTCA Role

Coordinate and facilitate community meetings to identify the community's interests and identify existing resources for the development of a trails system, protection of open space, and identification of other recreational opportunities that link important cultural and natural resources.

3. Crested Butte Perimeter Trail

Project Partner: Town of Crested Butte Parks and Recreation Department RTCA Contact: Hugh Osborne Location: Crested Butte

Project Goal

Create a continuos, non-motorized trail that encircles the town of Crested-Butte, along with a way-finding system to make it easy for both visitors and residents to get around. The project will include improvements to existing trails, building new pathways, and adding more amenities along the route.

RTCA Role

Provide technical assistance to improve existing trail and complete the Perimeter Trail surrounding Crested Butte.

4. Fowler River Trail

Project Partner: Town of Fowler RTCA Contact: Hugh Osborne Location: Fowler

Project Goal

Expand the recreational opportunities in and near the Town of Fowler by building new trails from the existing golf course trail to the Arkansas River. The project will improve access to the Arkansas River for kayaks and canoes. It will create new options for outdoor recreation and education, such as birding, walking, and learning in a natural setting.

Project Goal

Create new trails and other amenities in and around Silverton incorporating the ideas of adaptive re-use of impacted lands. Interpretive facilities that tell the many stories of Silverton will be found on the trail and in new and existing parks. Implementation of the many phases of this project - interpretive sign content research,

trail construction, and streambank restoration - has and will continue to involve residents and students from the local school district.

RTCA Role

Train local residents in trail construction and maintenance. Plan and design a trail across a wetlands area that will provide a better experience for the users while protecting the sensitive landscape.

7. South Platte River Corridor in Metro Denver

Project Goal

Habitat restoration, increased recreational opportunities, improved

public access, enhanced educational programming, and watershed-wide water quality improvement efforts related to approximately 20 linear miles of the South Platte river, greenway and trail.

RTCA Role

Facilitate coordination among the local, state, and federal organizations who are working on efforts related to the South Platte River corridor to advance priority projects, find opportunites to enhance projects via collaboration and increase the engagement of affected communities.
