LOS ANGELES, CA Connecting Youth With Their Community

You might think a trailhead in the middle of a major city sounds impossible-but over 60 high school students in Los Angeles saw the possibility, and they wanted to make it happen. To guide this idea, NPS helped the students document their vision for over 20 themed walking and bicycling routes to link various parts of LA. Partnering with the city's Planning Department and a local high school, the students planned a vibrant trail network to promote healthy recreation by providing non-motorized



access to community destinations. Using the LA State Historic Park as a "Community Trailhead," the trails would link LA's natural, cultural, and recreational assets, and it would showcase the city's history and growth. Based on the students' plan, the California Endowment will provide funding to create an informational kiosk and starting point for these trails at the LA State Historic Park site.

AKRON, OH Bringing Nature Back to the City

In the past, Haley's Ditch was a neglected and toxically polluted stream that ran through an industrial/residential area in Akron, Ohio. But when the Lockheed Martin Corporation acquired



the stream with orders from the Environmental Protection Agency to clean it up, this inspired a collaborative effort with the community to transform Haley's Ditch. With NPS, Lockheed, local residents, and the Western Reserve Land Conservancy working together, they didn't just clean up the stream, but also connected it to a nearby green space called Adam's Run. The group restored the stream and its habitat, and they also built a walking trail where local residents and workers can enjoy their daily dose of healthy recreation. Now, the neighborhood takes great pride in the new Haley's Run Park, and it provides a home to wildflowers, wildlife, and natural beauty. Thanks to this team's great work, Haley's Run will continue to positively influence surrounding development and the evolution of a vibrant regional trail network.
