Dear Mr. Director:

The following is my report of activities in Zion and Bryce Canyon National Parks for September, 1932:

000 General

020 General Weather Conditions

Heavy rains fell on the 22nd, 23rd, 26th, 29th and 30th, and showers on the 18th, 27th and 28th in Bryce. The first fifteen days were ideal for camping. In Zion with the exception of two or three rainy days the weather has been excellent for camping and hiking in the park. The temperature averaged 76.06. The warmest day, on the 6th, registered 98, and the coolest day 53, on the 10th. Storms did considerable damage to the road between Bryce and Tropic. No maintenance work has been done on the portion of this road within the park. The average temperature in Bryce was 53.5 degrees, the warmest day being 78 degrees on the 7th and the coolest being 32, on the 1st, 25th and 26th. The autumn leaves are coming out in both parks. The aspens in Bryce have taken on their yellow colors. Grass is green and growing in both parks. There has been sufficient moisture to make things grow.

120 Park Inspections by

121 Park Superintendent. At the close of August I was in Bryce Canyon National Park with Investigator Noble J. Wilt. On September 1 we took a horseback trip over the trails in the canyon and in the afternoon I returned to Zion by way of Cedar Breaks and Cedar City, dropping Mr. Wilt at the last named place. On the 4th I met Superintendent Tillotson, Floyd Gibbons and his Secretary and Mr. G. R. Parry at Zion. We drove over the Zion roads and in the evening went to Bryce. On the morning of the 5th we went out to the various points reached by road and drove to Cedar Breaks for lunch, thence to Cedar City and Lund where Mr. Gibbons caught a train and Mr. Tillotson and I returned to Zion. On the 10th I attended a monthly outing of the Associated Civic Clubs of Southern Utah and the Iron County Teachers Association at the Forest Service campground at Duck

Creek on Cedar Mountain. On the 13th with Assistant Superintendent Parker I made a complete trip by horseback over the West Rim Trail. On the 15th I went to Bryce with Assistant Landscape Architect Langley and on the same day we inspected the LB-1 road construction project and selected a location for the office building. On the 16th Associate Highway Engineer Brown, Mr. Langley, Ranger Cope and I went over the surveyed line of the Rim Road from Natural Bridge to Podunk Point. On the 17th Mr. Langley and I examined the proposed locations of residential and utility buildings included in the development outline, and then returned to Zion. On the 27th Mr. Langley and I went to Bryce to inspect the LB-1 construction project and the work in progress on the employees cabin and the office building.

123 National Park Service Officers. Superintendent Tillotson of Grand Canyon was in Zion and Bryce from the 4th to the 6th.

Assistant Landscape Architect Langley arrived at Zion from Grand Canyon on the 9th, where he remained for the rest of the month except for the short visits to Bryce mentioned above.

124 Other Interior Department Officers. Dr. H. E. Gregory completed his season's work and departed from Zion on September 6.

125 Other Governmental Officers. District Engineer B. J. Finch was in Zion September 1. L. M. Huggins, Bridge Engineer, of the Bureau District Office, was in Zion the 29th to 30th.

170 Plans, Maps and Surveys

A new plan for the office building at Bryce was received from the Chief Landscape Architect and forwarded for approval.

The work of preparing the 1933 development outline for each park has been started. Mr. Langley is assisting in this work.

190 Personnel

With the approval of the President to filling the vacancy, a recommendation was submitted for the appointment of Charles A. Gerrard to a new position of storekeeper-costkeeper, terminating his temporary appointment as storekeeper.

200 Maintenance, Improvements and New Construction

210 Maintenance

The East and West Rim Trails in Zion were damaged considerably during the last heavy floods and it was thought best to put them in good repair for the spring work. There is very little damage done these trails from the spring runoff. A crew of men was sent over both of these trails and they were repaired and put in excellent condition.

230 New Construction

The contractor for surfacing the floor of the valley road at Zion set up his gravel pit at Rockville early in the month and on the 12th began shoulder work. Although to the close of the month the contract had been awarded for more than a month and a half, the plant for mixing the surfacing material had not yet arrived. It is evident that the contractor will not be able to complete all surfacing work this year unless most unusually favorable weather conditions occur.

At the close of the month the contractor for supplemental construction work in the tunnel had completed the tunnel enlargement except for the short section below gallery 6. Three reinforced concrete columns of the 7 required immediately above gallery 1 were poured. The side walls of the reinforcement of the tunnel at gallery 3 had been placed. On the 27th following a shot for tunnel enlargement below gallery 6 a block of rock of about 1,000 cubic yards fell out of the ceiling completely filling the tunnel bore up for a distance of about 150 feet. It is tentatively estimated at this time that this will result in an additional cost of approximately \$12,000.

The Union Construction Company, contractor for the 1B-1 project at Bryce has made excellent progress. All clearing is completed and about a mile of road is rough graded.

Employees residence. The employees residence at Zion was completed on September 27 and accepted by the Superintendent. The contractors, Mathews and Kopp of Cedar City, completed their contract in scheduled time and performed their work in a very satisfactory manner.

Post construction. The entrances to the culverts on the floor of the valley project were enlarged to form catch basins to assist in the run-off of water during heavy rains. It is planned to install gradings over the openings of these culverts which it is hoped will keep rocks and debris from clogging the culverts in the future.

River control. Three hundred lineal feet of rock-filled dykes were completed on September 30 and this completed the river control program for the season.

Temporary bridle path near lodge area. The heavy floods of August 24-28 destroyed approximately one-half mile of the new bridle path constructed in 1931. This portion of the bridle path was located in the old river flood plain and it has been impossible to keep it in repair during the summer season. It was decided after the last heavy flood to not attempt to reconstruct it along its old location but to build up at the toe of the road fill along this section with one foot or more of clay material from the slides and along the floor of the valley road. This will probably be much easier to maintain than on the old location.

Buildings. Construction work has been started during the month on a one-room log office building and a two-room employees cabin at Bryce. Work has progressed very nicely on these two buildings during the month.

300 Activities of Other Agencies in the Park

314 Complaints

On the 2nd Mr. and Mrs. Schreiber of Omaha filed a verbal complaint with the ranger at the checking station alleging discourteous treatment by the clerk at Zion Lodge. Later they wrote a letter withdrawing the complaint, stating that they were then sure that it was unwarranted.

400 Flora, Fauna and Natural Phenomena

410 Ranger, Naturalist and Guide Service

Summary of current operations. The cataloging of the library books has been completed at Zion. The ranger-naturalists submitted a detailed report of their work and observations before the termination of their services. These are on file in the superintendent's office. The campfire and lodge lectures were discontinued September 23 as the attendance had dropped below a practical point. The Lodge recreation room is closed, but the campfires will be resumed whenever the number of visitors warrants.

Ranger-naturalist service was discontinued at Bryce on September 8. A report was submitted by the Naturalist to the Berkeley office covering the period from September 1 to 11 inclusive with estimates for the remaining part of the month. The summary of monthly activities is included in attached forms A and B. Separate forms are included for Zion and Bryce. Some lectures and trips have been conducted by the ranger service at Bryce after the termination of Mr. Weight's services there. A general summary of all educational activities for 1932 in Zion and Bryce National Parks is included in separate tables, No. A-Z and A-B.

Field Trips. The scheduled morning trip to the Narrows was discontinued on September 11. At Bryce all scheduled trips were discontinued on September 9.

Lectures. Lectures at the Zion Lodge were discontinued September 23. Campfire lectures were discontinued on September 11. It is possible that these will be renewed at times, but the recent number of campers has been very low. At Bryce, a few lectures were conducted by the ranger service after September 8.

420 Museum Service

Two rag rugs were recently added to the early settler exhibit. A painting of the park flower, the "Datura", has been framed and is now on exhibit.

At Bryce. Specimens of plants collected by Ranger-Naturalist Weight during the summer have been forwarded through the superintendent's office to the National Herbarium for identification.

470 Animals

Only one deer has been found dead this month, and apparently they have changed their diet or there is only a certain period of the year when the plant they were eating is poisonous. The deer are in excellent condition.

480 Natural Phenomena

The third brood of boxelder bugs has appeared along the floor of the canyon in great abundance. These are now found in clusters on the trunks of boxelders and underneath dried leaves. These insects are often a pest in early summer, but the nature of the vegetation at Zion offers little possibility of adequate control.
