The Old West Church (1823-1825) and churchyard are located along a maple-lined road approximately eight tenths of a mile south of Kent's Corner. The style of the building might be called "Colonial Survival" as it is reminiscent of late 18th century southern New England churches.

The structure is rectangular in plan, sheathed with white clapboards and has its gable end towards the road. The steeple is located at the front gable end and is constructed in three tiers. The third tier is octagonal and a green oval is painted in each panel forming the octagon. This is surmounted by a guilded wooden weathervane.

There are three main entrances arranged symetrically along the front elevation, each flanked by a wooden pilaster and the whole capped by a shallow cornice. These entrances open into a one story vestibule. Doors, corresponding to the entrances, open from the vestibule into the two story meeting room. Stairs lead from either end of the vestibule to a second story vestibule which in turn provides access to the galleries. The meeting room is flooded with light by two tiers of small paned, clear glass windows. Noverhanging galleries supported by square posts are located along the front and side walls leaving a two story central clear span and an unobstructed The church contains its original unpainted pine box pews with raised panel doors and side walls. The structure has never been electrified and is heated by two wood-burning stoves located under the rear gallery. Large wooden letters were set out in a broad semi-circle above the alter in 1886 and read "REMOVE NOT THE ANCIENT LANDMARK WHICH THY FATHERS HAVE SET".

The structure has undergone amazingly few alterations. They are as follows:

- The pulpit was originally the height of the balconies.
   It was lowered a few years after construction.
- 2. The stoves were added in 1831.
- 3. Lightning struck the steeple in 1953. Repairs were made and the weathervane was replaced at this time.
