
DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Madison Buffalo Jump, one of the most spectacular in the nation, is situated in a deeply serrated limestone bluff structure which forms the eastern wall of the Madison River Valley. The Madison River here has carved out a broad and fertile north-south valley some four miles wide, cut several hundred feet deep from the high plain which extends on either side. The eastern wall of the valley for some two miles on either side of the Buffalo Jump is deeply cut in ravines, rising sharply to the foot of sheer bluffs from twenty to one hundred feet in height.

The main jump is a cliff at least 30 feet high, making a huge semi-circular protrusion, with ravines cutting back on either side. The ravine to the south circles to the front of the jump. Here a precipitous slope extends from the foot of the cliff some 150 feet, becoming more gradual until it forms an irregular stream ravine about 200 feet across. To the north of the jump another ravine cuts deeply to divide the main cliff from an equally high promontory which contains important remains.

On the north side of the cliff area there is an old trail which leads to the plateau above the jump. It reaches the plateau where the five upper tipi rings are located. This trail may have originally been an ancient bison pathway along an east and west line which attracted hunters to the cliffs in this vicinity.

The site boundary beginning at the northwest corner near the unpaved road and corners of Sections 27, 28, 33, 34 runs one mile in an easterly direction; thence one mile in a southerly direction; thence one mile in a westerly direction to the intersection of the unpaved road; thence one mile in a northerly direction, following the unpaved road to the beginning point.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Buffalo jumps, or pishkuns as they are sometimes called, are usually found on the eastern approach to the Rocky Mountains from Wyoming to southern Alberta. It was discovered by the Indians of the area that small herds of bison could be injured or killed by driving them over the numerous cliffs or steep bluffs found in the region.

Before the day of the horse, and for some years thereafter, the Indians used the jumps extensively. They almost always had a large grassy prairie above and behind the precipice. The buffalo were then herded, sometimes from miles away, toward the cliff area. As the animals were brought near the jump the speed of the drive was increased until they were sent over the bluff on a hard run. Any animals not killed by the fall were dispatched by the arrows, lances and axes of the aborigines waiting below.

In the Madison River vicinity, cliffs are plentiful but apparently this pishkun was the only one in the area used in communal drives. The Madison Buffalo Jump area includes an Indian village site, a slaughter site, an archaeological site, the jump, and plateau area, old Indian trail, gravesite and lookout point. Near the junction of the two ravines are the remains of the village site of the last bands of Indians who used this jump some 200 years ago. A number of tipi rings and hearth sites mark the location of the village. Tipi rings also mark the lookout point and shelters on top of the jump.

A study of the many arrow points, knives, scrapers and a few bits of pottery which have been found reveals that the use of this jump probably extends back to the early phases of the forager, or middle period in the Great Plains pre-historic sequence. The major portion of the area is still intact for scientific exploration. The Madison Buffalo Jump vividly demonstrates a hunting technique used by pre-historic man on many occasions over a period of some 4,000 years. In the size of its bone deposits, its highly varied features and scenic beauty, this pishkun is a major archaeological site.

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
