Historical Significance:	

The residence at 220 North 16th Avenue is associated with North Yakima's earliest development period: 1885- 1900. Properties in the Summitview Acres Tract, platted May 31, 1889, were usually sold in parcels of several lots and large farms/orchards were established at the western slope of town. This house is significant as an excellent example of the "Queen Anne" style designed and built by tradesman, carpenter/contractors for middle/upper income families in business and professions. The Wilcox House is typical of the larger, two-story residences built in the "Queen Anne" style in Yakima for affluent families. Gabled roofs over projecting bays radiate from a single hipped roof. An octagonal tower rises above adjacent roof lines to form a focal point of the Queen Anne style. A verandah posts, ballustrade and open frieze spindlework. This house is important for its association with Yakima County's first woman legislator, Ina Phillips Williams (Republican), who served in the House of Representatives from 1916 to 1918. This house is also important for its association with Charles P. Wilcox whose trade as a carpenter/builder and owner of a Yakima lumber company helped shape architecture in Yakima. Lumberman Wilcox and his wife Anna Maria purchased five large lots in Summitville Acres on September 6, 1889, and constructed this residence on the front portion of the

Additional Descripton of Physical Appearance & Significant Architectural Features: (Architectural significance; can include interior & site features; address integrity issues specifically)

The Williams Home at 220 North 16th Avenue is a two story, wood framed residence exhibiting "Queen Anne" influence with clapboard and shingle siding. The building is organized with a central square plan under a single hipped roof with projecting squared bays under gable roofs. The hipped wood shingled roof includes a centered brick chimney with corbeled cap. (A modern metal flue has been installed within the chimney.) An octagonal turret is located at the front elevation (northeast corner) and has a steeply pitched roof with sheetmetal finial. The front porch includes a balustrade and open frieze of spindlework. The porch is curved along the front (east) and south elevation and is supported on concrete masonry blocks and turned posts. All windows are 1/1 double-hung wood units with the exception of the focal bay unit and the southern bay focal window which have colored glass panes surrounding a clear central pane above a single lower pane. The building has a brick foundation. Modern additions include a paneled wood entry door and a wood enclosed chimney at the northwest corner of the building. The integrity of the original design and details have been maintained. The interior includes beamed ceilings, hardwood floors, target moldings around windows and doors, and several fireplaces.

property. Wilcox was vice president of Wilcox Lumber Co. in Yakima. In 1908, he moved to California and sold the property to Wallis B. Williams. Williams was Secretary-Manager of North Yakima Milling Co. (a flour mill owned by Alexander Miller). His wife Ina received recognition for her activist role in state politics and local issues. The Williams family owned the property until 1944. The current owners John L. and Donna Cruse purchased the residence in 1985 and are restoring it to its original integrity.
