The Hyland Hotel is a property associated with the Settlement and Economic Development of Alaska's Matanuska-Susitna Valley multiple property nomination, and is nominated as a community center building within the New Deal Colony Settlement of the Matanuska-Susitna Valley in Alaska, 1935-1940, context.

The hotel was built in 1935 on one of the principal streets in Palmer, the town created by the Federal Government for Matanuska Colony rural resettlement program. The hotel is set back only a few feet from the road. The building is a two-and-a-half-story frame structure set on a full basement. It has a gable roof. Square in plan, the original building measures  $30 \times 30$  feet. It was covered with drop siding. Tall and narrow casement windows were used. A porch enclosed with multi-pane windows spans the front facade. In 1953, a  $10 \times 14$  foot, two-story addition was added to the rear of the building and the entire structure was covered with asbestos siding. The addition is not visible from the front elevation.

When it opened, the hotel had four single rooms, two double rooms, and three apartments. The only change to this interior arrangement has been combining one double room and one single room to create one larger unit. The exterior of the hotel, except for the siding added in 1953 that could easily be changed, remains the same. The doors and windows are original.

The Hyland Hotel was among the earliest commercial properties built in the new town of Palmer in 1935. Its establishment was an indication that private capital saw Palmer as an attractive business location and contributed to a feeling of permanence in the new town. Shortly after the arrival of the Matanuska Colony settlers, Myles and Joanna Hyland moved to Palmer from Girdwood, Alaska, where Myles had been working for the Alaska Railroad. The Hylands bought a lot from John Bugge, a pre-colony homesteader, in what is now downtown Palmer, and began building the hotel.

In September, the Hylands began digging the basement for the hotel by hand. To help financially, Joanna cooked and served meals in a tent on the property while the hotel was being built. Lumber for the hotel came from a dormitory that had stood at the nearby Eska coal mine. The Lutheran congregation purchased the dormitory and dismantled and moved it to Palmer to be used to build their church. The congregation sold the surplus lumber and windows. The Hylands furnished the hotel with one hundred dollars worth of furniture they purchased in Anchorage. When the hotel opened, single rooms rented for three dollars a day and double rooms for four dollars. Valley coal miners often rented rooms in the hotel during the winter months.

The Hylands operated the hotel together until Myles' death in 1949, then Joanna took over on her own. Joanna later married a local miner named James Smith, and they operated the hotel until 1966. Except for a brief period in the late 1950s, the hotel has continuously operated.
