Fromberg Opera House

The Fromberg Opera House is located in Fromberg, Montana, a small rural community in the southcentral portion of the state. The building is located about one block north of the business district and stands at the southwest corner of the intersections of Harley Avenue and C Street. The Opera House was built in 1908 in a vernacular style embellished by detailing typical of Victorian-era architecture. In 1940, the building was partially remodeled and became the American Legion Hall.

The one-story building is rectangular in plan, rests on a newer concrete foundation, and is topped by an asphalt-shingled gable roof. The exterior walls were refinished with stucco in 1940; several holes in the stucco reveal the original clapboard siding beneath. The stucco finish only extends a few feet into the gables, leaving much of the original treatment in the ends intact. An elaborate pattern of rectangular, scalloped, and diamond wood shingles accent the south gable; they frame the top of a round opening altered with the American Legion emblem. The north gable is sheathed with clapboard siding and has a round window with a quatrefoil wood-sash, infilled with boards. Much of the original detailing at the roof also remains, including: wide eave overhangs with beaded soffits, decorative cut rafter and purlin tails, and crown and fascia molding. Some original windows also remain. They predominately are narrow, two-over-two, double-hung wood-sash with board surrounds trimmed by crown molding; windows on the south are further accented by eyelet-like decoration. The original main entry to the building was likely centered on the south wall but is now covered over by stucco. On the east wall towards the south is a pair of slab doors; this doorway was added in the mid-1910s when the building was used as a motion picture theater. Other entries included a paneled door on the east wall towards the north end, and a half-light paneled-door on the north end of the west wall. Another door on the north wall has been boarded over.

The Fromberg Opera House retains integrity of design, materials, and workmanship. Although the exterior walls have been stuccoed, many of the building's key stylistic elements remain evident such as the elaborate shingle detailing in the front gable, quatrefoil-sash window in the rear gable, roof and window trimmings, and most original window units. Furthermore, the building still cleary exhibits its original form, massing, and scale.

Narrative Statement of Significance

The Fromberg Opera House is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places under the "Historic and Architectural Resources of Fromberg" multiple property listing. The significance of the building is established locally under the historic context of "Religious, Educational, Civic, and Social Activities in Fromberg, 1906-1925," and meets registration requirements developed for the associated property type "Religious, Educational, Civic, and Social Buildings." It is eligible for listing in the National Register under Criterion A for its association with the growth and emergence of Fromberg in first two decades of the twentieth century. The building retains sufficient integrity to demonstrate significance.

The Fromberg Opera House derives significance under Criterion A as an important reflection of the town's social and cultural development during its historic boom period (1906-1918). The Fromberg Opera House was the first public, social facility in town and served as the principal gathering place for entertainment and recreational activities in the community for over thirty years. The building was constructed by a group of town promoters in 1908 to host plays by professional troupes that traveled from town to town by train. It also quickly became used as a public hall where town and rural residents could socialize at dances and celebrations. At times the building functioned as a roller skating rink and in 1915 it offered the first glimpse at motion picture entertainment in Fromberg.


