

NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION

The Christenberry Club Room (KN. 7670¹) is located on Shamrock Avenue, and shares a tract of land on which is located Christenberry School. The Club Room is located at the northeast corner of the tract. The building fronts on Shamrock. To the rear is a modern facility that serves as the Christenberry Community Center. Adjacent to the community center and undergoing construction is a new school. Parking lots and a paved drive mark the western and southern approaches to the building, while to the north and east are houses that make up part of the Oakwood-Lincoln Park neighborhood.

The Club Room is a one story structure built of uncut brown sandstone laid in irregular courses. The building consists of two sections, built at the same time but designed to give the appearance of an original one and one-half story building on the east, with an adjoining one story ell. Both sections of the building are covered by a side gable roof finished with a slate roof covering.

The building has two primary elevations, one to the north, facing the residential neighborhood, and one to the south, approached by asphalt walkways and facing Christenberry Community Center. The northern facade is marked by a central enclosed projecting entry, roofed with a continuation of the structure's gable roof. It contains a plank door, a four light casement side window, and four light casement windows on each side of the projection. The door is approached by use of a marble step, and has been boarded over for security purposes. Three eight over eight double hung wood windows appear on the north elevation of the building. All have stone sills and wooden lintels.

On the south elevation, a central recessed porch, supported by square sawn wood columns, provides access to the interior, and serves as the primary entrance to the building. The plank door at this entry is also boarded over. A marble plaque on the wall under the porch roof is engraved with the following inscription:

"Christenberry Club Room. Built by N.Y.A. 1939. Barber & McMurry. Architects."

Three eight-over-eight double-hung windows appear on the south elevation with stone sills and wooden lintels.

The eastern portion of the structure is built with a stone exterior end fireplace flanked by six light casement gable end vents. Foundation vents are made of stones laid vertically with spaces between each stone. The adjoining one story ell is lower in elevation than the eastern portion of the structure, and is built with the same materials and fenestration. It also contains an exterior end stone chimney.

The interior of the Christenberry Club Room is divided into an entry, two bathrooms, and three meeting rooms. When the building is entered from the south, there is an entrance foyer. On the west end of the building is the largest room, which has a fireplace on the west wall. The room is approached from the foyer by marble steps, and has a marble floor. To the east is a small storage room and beyond that is another room with a centered

fireplace on the east wall and a staircase to a balcony. The rooms on the eastern side of the building have wood floors. Throughout the building, the walls are surfaced with tongue and groove wood paneling. Crown molding with dentils appears in all rooms.

The Christenberry Club Room, in both its interior and exterior appearance, has not been altered since its construction, showing only the result of years of use, rather than more drastic changes. In 1995, the building was renovated. However, no changes were made to the building and original materials were retained, including the repair of slate roof tiles.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Christenberry Club Room is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places under criteria A for the role it plays in illustrating the National Youth Administration, a New Deal program, and for the distinction it achieves in the Oakwood-Lincoln Park Community of which it has always been a part and under criterion C, for its architectural significance. It meets the requirements set forth in the Multiple Property Nomination "Historic and Architectural Resources of Knoxville and Knox County," under the context of Institutional and Organizational Buildings.

The Christenberry Club Room was built under the National Youth Administration (N.Y.A.). Although local records indicate that there were several rehabilitation and addition projects that were part of the National Youth Administration activities in Knox County, the Christenberry Club Room is the only known example of an N.Y.A. building that survives to illustrate their work here. The plans for the Club Room were the work of Barber & McMurry, a noted local architectural firm in Knox County. Barber & McMurry worked on several school buildings in conjunction with W. P. A. and P. W. A. funding. The design of the Club Room clearly reflects their enthusiasm and mastery of twentieth century revival styles. It was obviously designed to with the same care and architectural details and embellishments that can be found in their other work from the same era. The overall design of the building, with its suggestion of an original small colonial structure with an addition, shows an attention to detail typical of the firm.

The Christenberry Club Room functioned as an important part of the Oakwood-Lincoln Park Community. That community was developed around the turn of the century, as part of the expansion of Knoxville made possible by the rapid expansion of industries and wholesale trade. The neighborhood has continued to develop through the years, and is composed of relatively small frame housing, some of which was constructed as recently as the 1950s. Many of the residents of the community speak fondly of the years when the structure was used as a Club Room, and provided a central meeting place, as well as a location for home economics demonstration clubs, community weddings, a voting place and other similar celebrations. Even after the room was taken over by Christenberry Junior High School in the 1950s, the long tradition of a neighborhood center was recognized by the city, which provided a community meeting place adjacent to the Junior High School Building.

After the Club Room ceased to function as a community meeting place, it was used by the adjacent Christenberry Junior High School as a band room, and remained in active use until a few years ago. The Knox County School Board is in the process of adding to and rehabilitating the Christenberry facility, in order to create a magnet school which will replace several of the nearby neighborhood schools. When the classes formerly served at the facility were moved to other locations in order to allow for construction, the Christenberry Club Room was boarded over and the Oakwood-Lincoln Park Neighborhood Association approached the Knox County School Board and the City of Knoxville, asking that they be allowed to refurbish the building and use it as a community meeting space again. On behalf of the residents, the city has secured the building and intends to grant the Oakwood-Lincoln Park Neighborhood Association a long term lease. The neighborhood association, in turn, has restored the building repairing original materials. The repair work followed the Secretary of the Interiors standards and included the repair of original roof shingles.
