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NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION

Saint Andrew's Episcopal Church is located at 104 Hunter Avenue in a residential neighborhood on the northwest side of the city of Mullan, Shoshone County, Idaho. The building is located on the south side of Hunter Avenue near its intersection with Residence Street and Mill Street. The building faces north and backs on to a steep hill immediately to the south.

Saint Andrew's is a one story, gable-front structure which rests on a foundation of wooden posts set on new concrete pilings. The building is plank framed with a secondary stud wall affixed to the interior of the plank wall. The stud wall was added when the building was converted from a schoolhouse to a church in 1892. The exterior of the building is clad in simple wood drop siding with plain flat board decoration at the corners, sills and cornices. Vertical board siding screens the foundation pilings. The roof is steeply pitched and clad with metal panels of recent vintage.

The primary elevation of Saint Andrew's faces north on to Hunter Avenue. It consists of a front-facing gable with a central projecting entry vestibule. The vestibule is also gable fronted and features open, wooden entry steps, a round-arched entry opening, and simple, flat board trim similar to that on the main body of the building. The entry serves to shelter a large paneled Gothic-arch door. The vestibule is flanked by a single decorative Gothic-arched window on either side. These windows contain double-hung wood sash with a decorative Gothic muntin pattern. Window casements are simple, flat board trim featuring only a sightly projecting sill profile. These Gothic windows were added when the building was converted from a school to a church in 1892.

The side elevations (east and west) are identical. Each side features three Gothic-arched windows identical to those on the front of the building. The rear of the building is unadorned. The interior of the building is quite Spartan, consisting of only simple wall and door trim, plain pews and a minimal alter and pulpit. The building is presently used as a museum and for occasional functions.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Saint Andrew's Episcopal Church is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion A. This building is historically associated with the establishment of the city of Mullan. It served an important function in the development of the community throughout the historic period--acting as a focus for community life in this small mining town.

Beginning in 1883, significant gold, silver and lead deposits were discovered in the mountains surrounding the Coeur d'Alene River in Shoshone County, Idaho. This discovery lead to the first substantial influx of Euro-American settlement and mining activities into the area. A phenomenon commonly referred to as the Coeur d'Alene Rush. The area around the present town of Mullan first experienced substantial mining activity with the establishment of the Morning Mine in late 1884. A mining camp quickly sprang up in the vicinity and the Morning was quickly joined by the Hunter, the Evening and several other mining operations. Growth was accelerated by the construction of the Hunter concentrator plant, begun in 1885. By 1888 subsidiaries of both the Union Pacific and Northern Pacific railroad companies had constructed lines into the Mullan area. The plat for the town of Mullan was filed on August 4th, 1888. By early 1889 Mullan boasted 35 log or frame residences, two hotels, one saw mill, a weekly newspaper, and (most significantly for our purposes) a public school.

The Saint Andrew's Episcopal Church began its service to the Mullan community as its first schoolhouse. It was constructed on its present Hunter Avenue site in the late summer of 1888 and was in use for the fall term of that year. This facility served as the only educational institution in Mullan for the next four years. By 1892, however, continued growth in both the general and school-age population in Mullan had rendered the original one room schoolhouse woefully inadequate. In that year the local school district constructed a new multi-room school and disposed of the old building to the local Episcopal parish.

Prior to 1892, Episcopalians in Mullan had worshipped in private homes or traveled to nearby communities such as Wallace. When the opportunity to acquire the old school presented itself, the local parish was quick to take advantage of a permanent home. They quickly adapted the building for use as a church hall. This consisted mainly of replacing the old windows and door with new Gothic-style fittings and building an interior stud wall within the existing plank frame of the building.

Saint Andrew's continued to serve Mullan's Episcopalians as a parish church until it was sold to a private owner in 1982. In addition, and more importantly, this building served a larger role in the community. As in many small towns, Saint Andrew's served as a general meeting hall and social facility for the town of Mullan, particularly for the west side of town. This building hosted, in

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addition to religious services, a wide range of other community functions. As such, it played a significant role in the development and social fabric of Mullan through the historic period. It is also one of the few tangible reminders of the initial settlement of Mullan. A 1985 inventory of historic buildings in Mullan identified no other structures that were as closely associated with the early growth and development of the community. For these reasons the Saint Andrew's Episcopal Church is eligible for listing in the National Register under Criterion A.
