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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Wheeler Opera House is a three-story (with basement) sandstone and brick building constructed on a rectangular plan. The angle of the southeast corner is squared to form a minor entrance facade. The north and west, or rear facades, are constructed of brick, wholly without architectural ornament. The south and east, or front facades, are designed as an ornamental false front to be appreciated upon approach to the main entrance. The building comes closest to the Romanesque-Italianate architectural style.

The building has a hipped roof. The south facade of the building is crowned by a triangular pediment with an elaborately carved design. The southeast corner entrance is crowned by a half eliptical pediment. The south and east facades have a boxed cornice with decorated frieze.

Trabeated and round-headed structural openings are combined on the south and east facades. First-story round arches are surrounded by sandstone voussoirs and sills, while third-story openings of the same shape are accented by use of a contrasting stone. An unbroken bank of trabeated windows, headed by granite lintels, opens from the second story.

Within the general scheme of structural opening shapes described above, exceptions are employed. The regularity of arched openings on the first story<sup>m</sup> is broken on both the south and east facades by a three-sectioned trabeated opening, a full story in height. On the east facade, this opening is composed of single 2 sash and transom windows, flanking a central double entrance section. Wood transoms and mullions divide the space above the double entries. Sandstone columns mark the 3 main sections of the opening. On the south facade, the space divisions are indicated by decorative wood pillars. All three openings have been filled with wood facia.

Again on the third story, trabeated openings are combined with arched shapes. On the south facade, this deviation is part of a larger architectural feature. A grouping of three linteled windows is centered to match. in size and placement, a linteled grouping below. Above, three small round-headed windows repeat the pattern. Sandstone pilasters flank the trabeated openings. A second pair of flanking pilasters, in low relief, rises to the cornice. An elaborate carved pediment surmounts this facade unit.

The east facade is designed with greater regularity. Seven evenlyplaced tall round-headed windows open from the third story. The pattern is broken by an eighth arched window at the northeast corner, scaled to approximately one-third the size of the other openings. The seven main windows are higher than their first-story counterparts and are divided by wood transoms and mullions into rectangular lights. Each is headed by a granite lunette. An odd, 3-sectioned, rectangular window opens from the extreme northeast corner, directly below the cornice. The seven doublehung, double windows (1/1) on the second floor alternate with stone separators and wood separators. The eighth window at the northeast corner of the building is a single, double hung (1/1) window.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Construction of the Wheeler Block and Opera House began in June of 1888, a project financed by J. B. Wheeler, a New York investor who figured prominently in Colorado mining, banking and its general economic development. <u>W. J. Edbrook</u>, who designed the Tabor Grand Opera House in Denver, was the architect, and Peter Wilson was the contractor. The building was completed in 1889.

Originally, the ground floor contained the J. B. Wheeler Bank, a clothing store, a tobacco store, and a ticket office for the Opera House. The second floor contained professional offices and the Opera House occupied the entire third floor.

Opera House performances were booked through Peter McCourt's Silver Circuit theatrical agency and most of the well known performers to play in Denver and other western cities played here. For twenty years the Wheeler Opera House was recognized as the cultural center of this boom mining town. The large, modern building, its grand architecture, and its plush furnishings were a source of pride to the community, making it more than "just another mining town," and giving it a feeling of permanency.

In November of 1912 fire gutted the entire third floor opera house and that portion of the building was closed off and no longer used until 1947 when the city leased the upper two floors to the Aspen Company. This company reconstructed it back into a theatre, although not on the lavish scale originally employed.


Various professional offices are still housed on the second floor. The onetime bank quarters on the ground floor are now Chamber of Commerce offices and the Colorado Mountain College office. The other portion of the ground floor is now a thrift shop.

The building is publicly owned. Local individuals and groups are concurrently raising funds to restore the Opera House and the rest of the building for public use. The plan is to make the Opera House, once again, the cultural center of the community. But it means much more to the historically minded in this mining town turned-ski-and-cultural-center. Too much of the colorful heritage of Aspen is becoming hidden by the modern in this growing resort. The Opera House is perhaps one of the most outstanding examples of Aspen's proud and lusty past as a mining town. Its architecture, considered unique and colorful when the building was first constructed, remains a sturdy reminder of the permanence of bygone days.

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
