Chautauqua, established in New York in 1874, rapidly became a major cultural influence in the mid-west, and particularly in Iowa. Thornton (1952:102) notes the establishment of a chautauqua at Clear Lake, Iowa, in 1876. As many as 500 separate chautauqua assemblies existed in Iowa during the 1920's (Thornton: 1952:109). It became a part of the mid-western life-style and did not diminish in importance until the advent of radio and the automobile.

Most of the chautauqua enclosures were tents, and these were lost with the passage of time. The Red Oak Chautauqua Pavillion, built in 1908 by the Chautauqua Association, is an exception. It is clear evidence of a belief that chautauqua would endure as an institution.

The opening address at this pavillion was made by William Jennings Bryan. Other famous names on the program included Jane Addams, the world-famous social settlement leader, Governor Robert M. La Follette of Wisconsin, and Gipsey Smith, world evangelist, preacher, and lecturer.

The Pavillion was utilized for the annual chautauqua programs until 1929. It is the only permanent chautauqua facility known to still exist in the State, and is one of the most potent reminders of Iowa's cultural heritage.
